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# Information Referral and Support Services

Information Referral and Support Services (IRSS) is the gateway to all Prevention services. A dedicated staff of IRSS Social Workers support DHS and provider staff and clients by assessing a family's needs and linking them to the most appropriate services to help meet those needs. Moreover, they ensure that those services are accessible by locating them where youth and families already are. Services are available through community based "one-stop shopping" sites in neighborhood schools, community centers, and in the homes of the families DHS serves.

# Pre Alternative Response Services

Pre Alternative Response Services (Pre ARS) provides a range of case management services to families in need of support but not in imminent risk of danger or exhibiting safety threats. Case management seeks to maintain family stability and well-being, reduce risk factors for families, increase community support networks and linkages for families and children, and increase a family's ability to address its own needs. Services include home visits, family assessments, development of support plans, social support referral and linkages, and monitoring. Service duration is three months in most cases.

**Pre ARS General Service** includes visits to the home a minimum of once a month. **The Pre ARS Partnership** program, which serves families with children ages 0-5, and children of any age with identified special needs (i.e. medical, emotional and/or physical). This category also includes families in which caregivers may be exhibiting behaviors that may pose a safety threat to children either presently or in the near future (i.e. drug usage, alcoholism, mental health or a domestic violence history). The Partnership offers similar services but includes a minimum of two monthly home visits and requires outreach to the family within 48 hours of referral. # Alternative Response System

The mission of the Alternative Response System (ARS) is to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children who are at risk of abuse or neglect. The criteria for enrollment are families who have been reported to DHS and have certain risk factors but no active safety concerns that would warrant a child's removal from the home. Following a comprehensive family assessment, families are offered an array of supportive services for up to 90 days; these services may include case management, parent education and support, parent aide services, homemaker services, housing resources and advocacy, child care referrals, and behavioral interventions with children. The goal is to prevent the need for entry into the formal child abuse system by emphasizing family engagement, family-centered practice, and service intervention.

Families enter ARS following a report to the Hotline or following an investigation of a Hotline report. If a safety assessment indicates moderate risks to children with no safety threats, the family is referred to one of the following ARS providers:

# **CAPTA Case Management Services for Women with Children in Substance Abuse Treatment**

The CAPTA program provides services to pregnant or parenting mothers receiving substance abuse treatment in residential and outpatient programs. To receive this service, women must be enrolled in treatment at one of the several designated treatment centers designed to reduce the incidence of abuse and neglect among women with dependency issues. Women are linked to a Family Services Coordinator who develops a plan for children while mother is undergoing treatment. The program also provides an aftercare component that provides intensive ongoing services to help the child and mother accomplish family goals inclusive of sustaining recovery.

# Parenting Education and Support

CBPS offers a variety of support and education groups for parents and caregivers. These programs are designed to support parents and caregivers in developing and enhancing their parenting skills, providing their understanding of child development, trying alternative approaches to child-rearing, and learning techniques to reduce the stress that can undermine parental functioning. Parent educators are trained on the latest research and best practices to support parents and caregivers.

“Placement” groups provide support and education specifically for biological parents who have lost custody of their children and are seeking reunification. Other groups are designed for parents and caregivers whose situations put them at high risk of involvement in the child protection system, including those affected by substance abuse, mental illness, mental retardation, homelessness, physical disabilities, and incarceration.

CBPS also supports general parenting groups and a variety of support groups for specialized populations, including fathers, teen parents, parents of teens, older caregivers, and kinship/relative caregivers. Programs may also be geared to adoptive and foster parents, parents who have been involved in the child protection system and are at risk of re-entry, sexual minority parents, and parents whose children are involved in the juvenile justice system.

# Housing Support

The Housing Unit under CBPS manages a number of programs to aid clients in finding stable housing. One of these programs is the Supportive Housing Program (SHP), designed to help homeless older youth who have transitioned out of DHS placement. Through a partnership between DHS and the Office of Supportive Housing (OSH) and with funding through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), transitional and permanent housing units have been established specifically for this population. Youth receive case management and a range of social services, including cash assistance, life skills counseling, housing counseling, education and job counseling, linkages to behavioral healthcare and other support services. Youth who are parents will receive parenting education and help accessing child care. The length of stay is up to two years and based on the individual service plan. *Eligibility requires active enrollment in the Achieving Independence Center.* Achieving Independence Center (AIC) will refer youth to a provider agency. Youth who are not already enrolled in the AIC should call the AIC at (215) 574-9194 for enrollment information.

# Truancy Intervention

DHS works in collaboration with the School District of Philadelphia, Family Court, and other partners to improve school attendance and reduce truancy through multiple strategies. Currently eight Regional Truancy Courts operate in eight regions of the city to hear cases involving truancy of youth in 4<sup>th</sup>-10<sup>th</sup> grades. Approximately 18 community-based agencies provide family support/case management for these families to resolve the underlying issues contributing to the truant behavior. Services are usually provided for 90 days and include comprehensive assessments, a family development plan, home visits, strength-based case management (including referral and linkage to appropriate services) and follow-up.

***Enrollment in the Regional Truancy Courts program is limited to families with youth listed as truant by the School District of Philadelphia.***

Truant children in grades K-3 are referred directly to CBPS and connected with Pre ARS Management or other appropriate services. *Families with children in grades K-3 experiencing school attendance issues can access services through IRSS at 215-683-4000.*

# Childcare Eligibility Unit

The Childcare Eligibility Unit is housed within Community Based Prevention Services and is responsible for monitoring the eligibility of those families and children who receive in home services or are committed to DHS receiving substitute care to sustain placement or facilitate reunification and require a daycare subsidy from DHS.

Monitoring is multifaceted and requires collaboration with multiple entities; CYD worker, Keystone Stars and Child Care Information Services (CCIS). Primarily, we want to assure that these children:

- ✍ Receive services from daycare providers meeting the Keystone Stars requirement of two(2) or more stars.
- ✍ That child(ren) have been placed on the Child Care Works (through CCIS) waiting list.
- ✍ Assure that child is picked up by CCIS in a timely manner and promptly removed from DHS subsidy.

# Education Support Center

The **Education Support Center (ESC)** is designed to improve the educational stability and outcomes for **children in DHS care**. We help identify educational barriers and offer a streamlined point of access to resolve them.

## What we do:

- ✍ **Provide** individual educational consultations to DHS and provider case managers, school district staff and resource families with the following:
  - Help child remain in school of origin when they come into placement or there is a placement change
  - Assist with transportation plans related to staying in the school of origin
  - Ensure a next day school transfer when necessary
  - Address reading and/or math failure, unexcused absences, and discipline and behavior incidents
  - Address Special Education concerns
- ✍ **Coordinate** communication and planning among children's service providers and school staff to remove educational barriers and coordinate appropriate service supports
- ✍ **Track** educational indicators for children in DHS care in order to identify early warning signals of educational challenges
- ✍ **Lead** and **facilitate** the integration of educational development into child welfare practice; and
- ✍ **Develop** inter-agency communication and practice protocols between DHS, School District of Philadelphia, and other public and non-public schools to promote a collaborative approach to serving the educational needs of children in DHS care.

## How to contact us

ESC Education Liaisons are available to help identify and remove educational barriers for children in DHS care. They are **not** case managers but work with DHS case workers, school counselors and providers to ensure a successful education experience for children in placement or other DHS care.

## APPEN DIX:

### Division of Children and Youth

The Division of Children and Youth (CYD) responsible for investigating all reports of child abuse and neglect and assigning families to the appropriate services. Services provided by CYD include In-Home Protective Services, foster care, kinship care, and adoption. In addition, the Division manages two key support centers for youth and families, as described below.

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#### **Support for Parents of Children in Placement: *Achieving Reunification Center***

Achieving Reunification Center (ARC) is a one-stop center for parents with children in out-of-home placement. ARC grew out of the recognition that parents who have children in placement are frequently faced with numerous and often competing requirements mandated by child welfare, public benefits and workforce policies. For many parents these mandates can be overwhelming. At the ARC, parents can receive a host of services, all under a single roof, that are designed to help them navigate and fulfill these various requirements. By bringing systems together the ARC helps parents achieve economic self-sufficiency and positive outcomes for their families. Services include workforce development, counseling and support, parent education, housing, financial counseling, mental health, and child care.

Achieving Independence Center (AIC) is a one-stop center designed to help older youth in out-of-home placement make a successful transition to adulthood. The Center assists youth ages 16-21 in developing independent living skills, building a network of social supports, reaching education and employment goals, and finding safe, affordable housing. Youth work one-on-one with coaches to create customized service plans designed to help them achieve their goals. Youth have access to a state-of-the-art computer lab, tutors for all subject areas, and a large network of professional staff and community partners. The Center offers non-traditional hours and flexible scheduling. Youth have an opportunity to earn financial incentives for participation in classes and workshops. Transportation assistance is available.
